The Brain Cancer Centre has a focus on investing in vital brain cancer research so that one day there will be no lives lost to brain cancer. The Centre aims to create a brighter future for brain cancer patients and their families and ultimately find a cure for this devastating disease.

Camperdown College has close ties with the Brain Cancer Center, as our loving past student Lachie Stephenson sadly lost his life to this disease in 2022, which is the leading reason behind why we have chosen to raise funds for the Centre.

The Junior Campus raised funds by selling blue and red lolly bags, holding a special lunch and bringing in a gold coin donation for wearing red/blue clothes or sporting attire on the day. They also celebrated Lachie's love for basketball and sport on the day by holding a range of different sporting games at lunchtime.

The Senior Campus each contributed a gold coin for wearing their favourite sporting clothes and enjoyed the chance to have a sausage for lunch complete with a can of soft drink and a bag of blue and red lollies.

We were overwhelmed by the support shown today and very proud to say that we raised at least \$2000 in total for The Brain Cancer Centre which will be donated via Lachie Stephenson's fundraiser *Cure Brain Cancer for Stevo*. Our Junior Campus students also worked hard to make a 10m long coin line which totalled \$87.15 for the Royal Children's Hospital's Good Friday Appeal.

The Preps did a magnificent job conveying their dreams for future

careers with many police, farmers, and vets and a few rarefied occupations like a mermaid and 'rubbish gatherer' shared. Both the Junior and Senior Campus Celebration of Learning Assemblies were capably led by our captains, with Charlie Unwin standing in for Oliver Horspole at the Junior Campus. The range of achievement and progress that was celebrated is indicative of a very focussed and dedicated approach to learning and doing one's best. Congratulations to all students who received awards.

Earlier this week, our new Principal, Xavier Davis, visited both campuses. Xavier is looking forward to beginning at the start of next term. He enjoyed being introduced to each class at the Junior Campus and attending the Senior Campus Celebration of Learning Assembly. Xavier has many future plans for the College and as a school community we are very much looking forward to him taking us on the next stage of our continuous improvement journey.

Camperdown College staff and students have been showcased this term via various forms of media for their work in Sounds-Write and High Ability programs. This week, four Year 10 students have hit the screens through a case study of Senior Campus sun smart behaviours that was filmed at the end of 2022. The five-minute film is embedded on the SunSmart website. Camperdown College was selected for the case study because very few secondary schools meet the SunSmart guidelines, and we have been accredited in this for last three years. Of particular interest was the use of student voice in the development of the policy. Many thanks to Rebecca Johnson, Sadie Walsh, Finn Tolland and Stella Horspole for being great sports and taking up the challenge of placing the College in the spotlight.

The CEO of SunSmart expressed gratitude and congratulations to all involved for their patience, input and commitment to developing a school community that is proud to be SunSmart and walks-the-talk when it comes to embracing sun protection. As a token of appreciation, the Senior Campus has been gifted a Sunsquirt kiosk, including 5L of sunscreen, valued at over \$1,500. The Sunsquirt kiosk is a portable sunscreen machine that dispenses single measures of sunscreen, specifically Cancer Council SPF50+ sunscreen. The kiosk is currently being customised with the school's logo and colours.

We have received confirmation that we have been accepted to participate in 'The Victorian Young Leaders: Indonesia Virtual Pilot' 2023. This fully-funded opportunity from the Victorian Department of Education, in partnership with Asia Education Foundation (AEF) at the University of Melbourne commences in Term 3 where four students will engage in 2 hours of online, immersive Indonesian Language learning each day from 1pm – 3pm. This is a wonderful opportunity for a maximum of four Year 9 students and will provide them with the ability to fast track their competency in oral and written Indonesian.

I would like to thank Parents & Friends, School Councillors, staff, families and students for their support whilst I have held the Acting Principal position for the past nine months. Your support has been very much appreciated and has allowed me to continue the unrelenting focus on excellence, providing the students of Camperdown and the wider community with a positive and successful education experience. I look forward to the future building works at the Junior Campus having worked closely with Buildings and Grounds and Jacinta Tolland to oversee the planning for the student toilet refurbishment, changes to the façade of the main building, erection of a new ramp and steps at the entrance, construction of an all abilities toilet space and ramps internally to the library and the back of the school. All of these works are currently out to tender. In closing, I would particularly like to express my gratitude to Suzanne Maskell and Jacinta Tolland for their amazing support, leadership and tireless work.

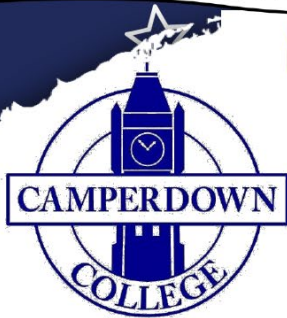
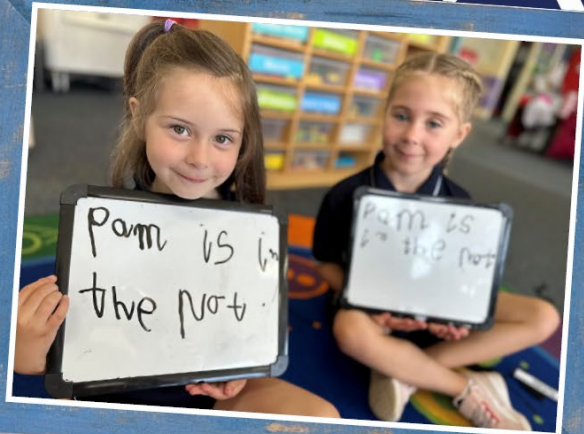

Staff and students this term have implemented Ready to Learn Scales into their classrooms as a tool to support students in co-regulation or self-regulation.

A Ready to Learn Scale is a system used by students to identify difficult emotions or stress, both collectively and individually. It allows them opportunities to learn how to select activities and resources to help them move to an optimal level for learning. These scales allow our staff to see whether a positive primer, escalating or de-escalating brain break may be needed to support or assist students to regulate. Our aim this year is to ensure that we are supporting our students to be in the optimal 'ready to learn zone', through co-regulation while we are working towards teaching our students how to use this process on their own through self-regulation.

Ready to Learn @ The Junior Campus

If you listen closely enough, you may hear the words 'Where are we on the learning scale?'. This term students have undertaken explicit learning on how to use 'Ready to Learn' scales. Students were introduced to this tool and have contributed to the displays by identifying what emotions or feelings we could experience at each stage of the learning scale. The scales have been created to ensure they are age appropriate and that consistent language is used from Prep through to Year 6.

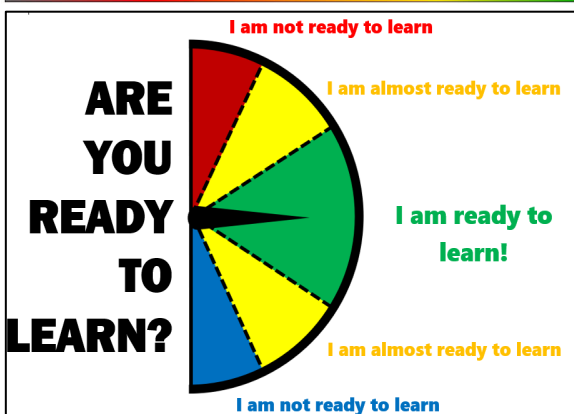
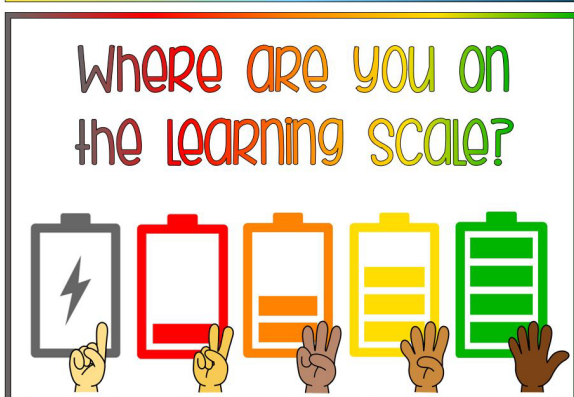
In Prep – Year 2 classrooms, students are using a 3-point scale supported by the visuals of the weather. With students having a shared understanding of what each point of the scale means to them.

1. No way, am I ready to learn!
2. I am ok to learn.
3. I am pumped for learning!

In the Year 3 – 6 classrooms, students are using a 5-point scale with batteries representing each stage of the Ready to Learn Scale.

1. No way, am I ready to learn!
2. I am feeling 'blah' about learning.
3. I am ok to learn.
4. I am good to learn.
5. I am pumped for learning!

These visuals are supported in our specialist classroom settings, where both learning scales are displayed to ensure students have ample opportunities to check in and practise co-regulation and self-regulation.



Ready to Learn @ The Senior Campus

If you were to wander around the corridors at the Senior Campus, you would see that each classroom has a Ready to Learn Scale front and centre to the entrance of each learning space. This placement is important as our secondary students are routinely moving from one classroom to another, it reminds the students as they enter each room to check in with themselves and assists them to identify which 'zone' they are in.

Our Senior Campus Ready to Learn scale has been constructed with the input of all Senior Campus teachers and is colour coded to align with the Zones of Regulation emotions. The question our students are regularly asked to consider is, "Are you ready to learn?". They are encouraged to articulate to their teachers whether they are 'not ready to learn' in the red zone (mad, angry, terrified, losing all control) or the blue zone (sad, sick, tired or bored), whether they are 'almost ready to learn' in the yellow zone (silly, excited, worried or frustrated) or if they are 'ready to learn', in the green zone (happy, calm, peaceful), our optimal emotional zone for learning.

This explicit communication enables the students to be more attuned with their emotional state and assists teachers to tailor their lessons in a way that supports the learning of all students. Teachers can utilise a variety of positive primers or de-escalation activities and brain breaks throughout their lesson to co-regulate with their students when needed. Resourcing is also being put towards equipping each classroom with supplies that assist students to self-regulate when they can identify that they need help to shift themselves from a blue, red, or yellow zone, into the green 'optimal learning' zone.

It has been delightful to see our students taking the time to check in with themselves, identify their feelings and to overhear the conversations around what they can do to help them move into the ready to learn zone. We are looking forward to seeing the positive impact this will have on our students as the year progresses.

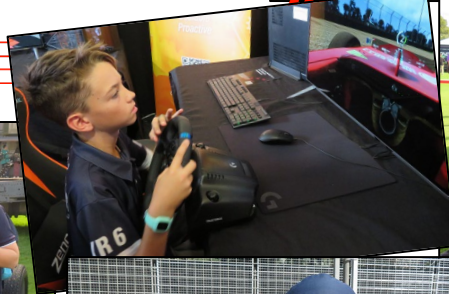

FORMULA 1 AUSTRALIAN GRAND PRIX 2023

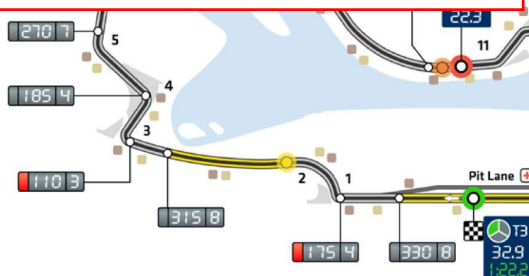


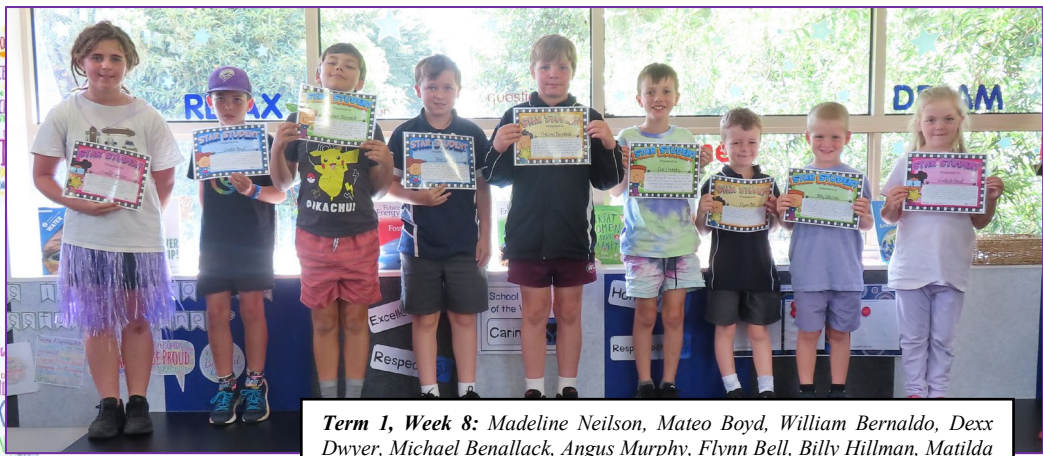
