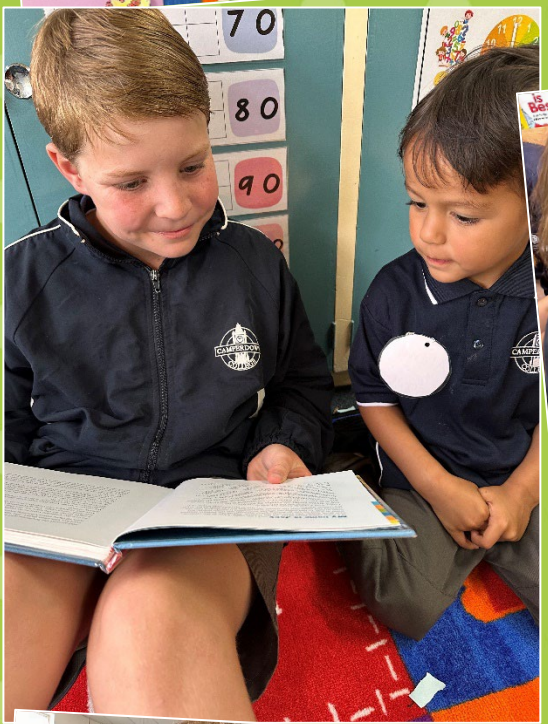

Prep students at Camperdown College engage in a structured synthetic phonics approach, called Sounds-Write, as part of their literacy learning. The ability to read proficiently is fundamental to a student's success at school in all areas of the curriculum. At Camperdown College, we engage in a Science of Reading approach which provides the strongest evidence about how young children learn to read.

The Science of Reading approach teaches reading in an explicit and systematic way, with phonics instruction forming a prominent element of this approach. Phonics is the process whereby students understand that the words we say can be communicated in print (letters and words). Our synthetic phonics approach starts with spoken language as the base, as speaking is something students have acquired prior to starting school. We then link this spoken language with written language, by students being taught sounds and then the letters that represent these sounds in words.

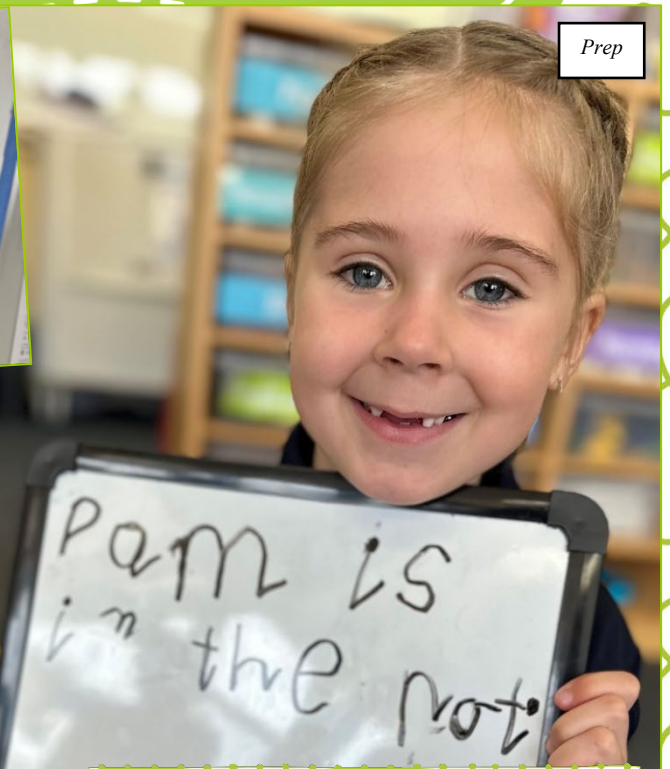
Camperdown College has implemented this structured phonics approach since 2017, with our current Year 6 students having had phonics since Prep and every year thereafter. Phonics is taught at *every* year level and in *every* classroom, making our students expert readers, writers and spellers.

The implementation of this phonics approach throughout Camperdown College is highly regarded by other schools and is showing exceptional results with the reading and writing development of our students. Camperdown College is currently one of two Sounds-Write trainer schools within Australia meaning we welcome other schools into our classrooms on a regular basis to learn from our teachers, students and whole school approach. This is something we are extremely proud of!

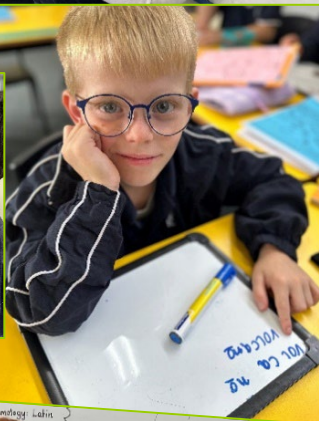
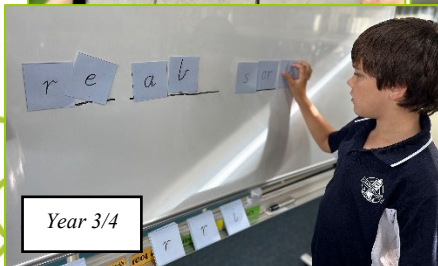

Our current Year 6 students have been taught phonics since Prep and showed outstanding results last year (2022) in their NAPLAN testing:

44% of students were in the Top 2 Bands for **Reading** (Similar Schools 33%, Schools in our Network 38%);

41% of students were in the Top 2 Bands for **Grammar and Punctuation** (Similar Schools 20%, Schools in our Network 25%);

28% of students were in the Top 2 Bands for **Writing** (Similar Schools 19%, Schools in our Network 20%).

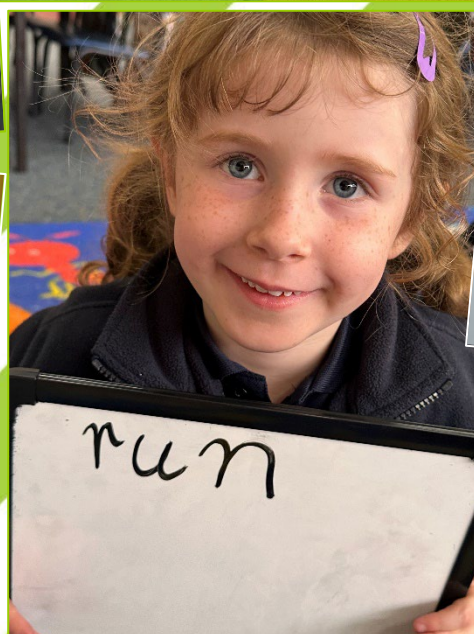

Reading: Camperdown College students engage in a daily literacy block where they are immersed in the reading process. Students listen to and engage in shared and modelled reading experiences where they enjoy a love of literature, whilst also developing their skills, strategies and phonological awareness to equip them as they learn to become readers. Learning to read successfully is something that we pride ourselves on here at Camperdown College for all students.

Students have their own book box filled with engaging and readable texts. Students have a mix of stories, non-fiction texts and plenty of decodable readers that allow comprehensive phonics skills to be applied correctly and with success. Prep students read from these books daily in a comfortable place within the classroom, and some days with a friend, practising essential skills that set them up for a wonderful and successful journey as a reader.

Writing: Prep students engage in the writing process from the very first day of school at Camperdown College. Students apply their phonics knowledge when engaging in written communication. Quickly, students are able to write about situations and experiences that they are familiar with, listening to sounds and recognising letters that represent these sounds.

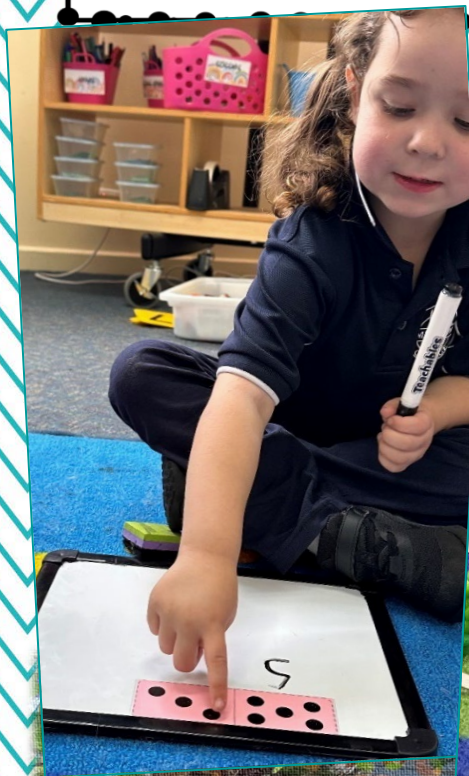
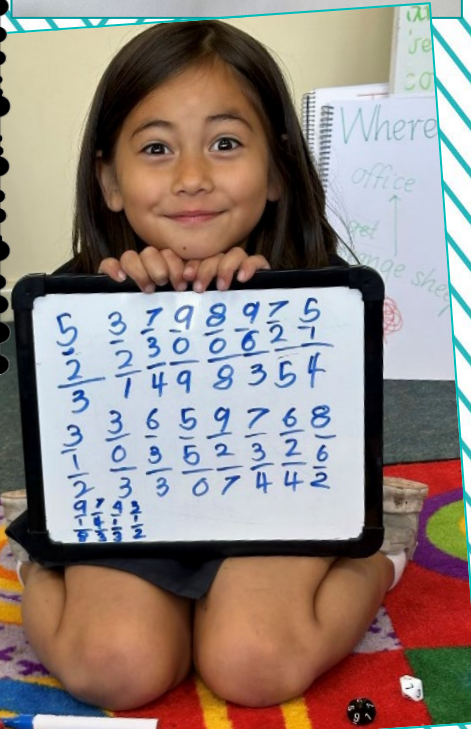
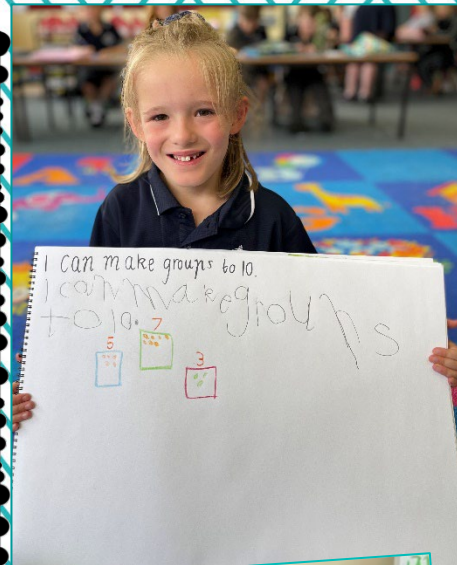

Mathematics: Mathematics is a daily occurrence within the Prep room at Camperdown College. We promote and engage in an approach that fosters problem-solving and explicit teaching to ensure students are given the opportunities to develop the many connections within the mathematics curriculum. We prioritise the 'Big Ideas in Mathematics' at each year level, with the Big Idea: *Trusting the Count*, being explored thoroughly in Prep. This involves students spending quality time exploring numbers to 10 and the many, many elements involved, ensuring a strong foundation for future learning. Concrete materials and project investigations reinforce the concepts and proficiencies that are so important in mathematics.



INTEGRATED STUDIES

Students undertake a thorough investigation of a topic each term for Integrated Studies. This promotes group work, partner work and an expansion of their comprehension of the world around them. 'Australian Animals', 'The Camperdown Community', 'Families', 'Being Healthy' and 'All About Me' are topics that our Prep students enjoy learning about through group work, craft activities and technology based projects. Students are also exposed to STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) activities and music within the Prep classroom and through a dedicated STEM session with a specialist teacher each week. We explore our local community on many excursions and trips to bring this learning to life and expand our developing understanding of the world around us.

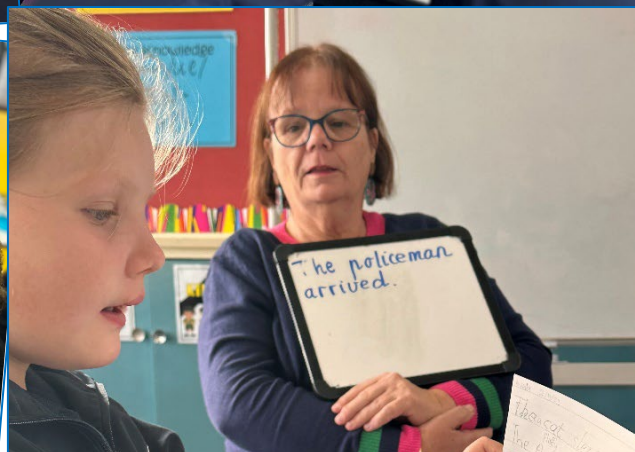
Targeted teaching and learning is something we work hard at delivering within each classroom at Camperdown College.

Students are aware of their strengths and learning goals through regular teacher feedback supporting growth and improvement within a supportive and positive learning environment. Walking into all classrooms, learning is visible with student goals on display along with learning intentions stating what is being taught. Students are aware of what they need to do next to achieve the expected outcomes.

Learning support is provided to students who would benefit from additional assistance in achieving their learning goals.

Qualified teachers and experienced education support staff work with students in small, focussed sessions that target specific needs ensuring successes and positive experiences transpire. Close monitoring and regular meetings between staff ensure that the learning support a student is receiving is always the right support. This year, we have

qualified teachers providing learning support in both our Prep – Year 2 Department and our Year 3 – 6 Department, complemented by a team of education support staff.

At Camperdown College, we have two High Ability Practice Leaders (HAPL) across both campuses, with Miss Madison Helmore located at our Junior Campus.

Miss Helmore works closely with classroom teachers to ensure that high ability students (students who show a skill level above expected levels) are challenged and supported. Opportunities are made available inside the classroom environment and day to day learning program, as well as extra opportunities such as participation in the Department's Enrichment Series for High Ability students and the Victorian High Ability Program (VHAP).

Students are taught at their point of need, and this is especially so for our high achievers. Students are aware of themselves as a high ability student that is achieving above the expected level. This awareness, along with learning experiences that challenge and develop their extended skill set, is present in all classrooms and in all curriculum areas.

Prep students at Camperdown College enjoy house sporting carnivals, including athletics and cross country. Our swimming program, which commences in Term 4 for our Prep students, teaches vital swimming skills with qualified swimming instructors and is a real highlight of the year.

The house system has been set up to cater for both competitive and non-competitive activities. These may include activities such as sport, yard duty, swimming, athletics and cross country carnivals and citizenship activities. STEM: At Camperdown College, we have a designated STEM program which students immerse themselves in each week. The STEM curriculum incorporates four specific disciplines – Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics. All students from Prep are involved in a weekly STEM lesson. Our STEM curriculum provides opportunities for students to develop an understanding of important scientific concepts and processes as well as opportunities to apply problem solving skills when designing and creating. STEM is most definitely a highlight of the week for our students!

Library: The Junior Campus Library houses a central collection of 16,000 print and multimedia resources to support teaching and learning activities and student recreational reading needs. Classes visit the Library weekly with our School Librarian and at other times with their classroom teacher. All students are encouraged to borrow on a regular basis.

A sequential camping program is offered from Prep – Year 6 at Camperdown College.

Prep – Year 2: Students in Prep – Year 2 take part in several local excursions per year whilst also taking time out to enjoy local theatre. Bus Travel: (bus travel is free to your closest government school):

This is organised by the Senior Campus bus coordinator. Junior Campus pick up is from the McKinnon Street gate. Students are supervised by Bus Duty teachers until the bus travellers arrive in the morning and depart in the afternoon.

Each Prep (or new student) bus traveller is assigned a bus buddy. This bus buddy helps each child get on the correct bus safely after the school day.

Students travel to the Senior Campus, where some students change to their home bus. Any changes to normal bus travel arrangements will require parents to phone the office or write a note explaining the changes each time.

School Crossings:

These are provided in Brooke Street and Walls Street. Crossing Supervisors have been employed to assist children using both crossings. Children are expected to obey the Crossing Supervisor's instructions.

Bicycles:

Unless the distance from home to school is too great, we urge you to support your children to walk or ride to school. Where a bicycle is used it is wise to undertake regular safety checks and give a reminder on traffic rules and laws. In accordance with Safety Traffic Regulations children are required to wear approved safety helmets when riding bicycles and be accompanied by an adult if younger than 10 years of age. Children should remember that, if they use the school crossings, they must walk across, not ride their bicycles. Children are not to ride bicycles or scooters in the playground when travelling to and from school.

Compass:

Camperdown College parents are encouraged to sign up for our online communication and assessment portal, Compass. You will be able to access Compass via computer, tablet or mobile phone (iPhone or android) by downloading the Compass School Manager app from the Apple or Android app store or using the web address:
<https://camperdowncoll-vic.compass.education/>.

Compass enables you to view the learning cycles that your child is working on as well as providing you with a progress report every six weeks. Parent Teacher Interview bookings are also made through Compass.

Through the parent portal you can view your child's up-to-date class and school attendance information, approve or enter upcoming or past absences for your son/daughter, update your registered email and mobile number (used for SMS alerts) details, pay the voluntary parent contributions, access the College calendar, view and pay for your child's camps, excursions and sporting events and see progress and end of semester school reports.

All new parents/guardians will be sent home the appropriate information to be able to register with Compass.

Newsletter:

A key source of communication with parents at Camperdown College is our school newsletter, the Camperdown Contact. This is distributed to students fortnightly on Friday afternoons. Parents can request a hard copy of the newsletter be sent home with their children. Alternatively it is available on Compass or can be emailed.

Parents are advised to seek out the newsletter each fortnight as it contains news on a wide range of topics relevant to the College, to education generally and to the community. Important dates, response slips, changes to school routines, meeting details and opportunities for celebrations are also included. A calendar of events and community information is also included as a regular feature.

School Website:

The Camperdown College website (<http://camperdowncoll.vic.edu.au>) is another way to keep up to date with what is going on at Camperdown College. The newsletter and calendar of events are added fortnightly along with extended information about upcoming events.

Camperdown College provides students with free instruction but also invites voluntary parent contributions. A high level of support for these voluntary contributions enables School Council to provide first class equipment, facilities and experiences at our Junior and Senior Campus. For example, every student in Year 3 – 6 is provided with their own laptop for use at school. As a guide, the yearly voluntary parent contribution for Prep – Year 2 in 2023 was \$240. In addition, parents provide a small number of classroom supplies for their student to complement the materials provided by the school.


Camps, Sports & Excursions Fund (CSEF):

Any parent in possession of a Commonwealth Pensioner Health Benefits Card is entitled to apply for the Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF) for each child aged 5 to 15 years (\$125 per year for students in Prep – Year 6 and \$250 per year from Year 7). Application forms are available from the College at the beginning of the year. Parents may use their CSEF to meet costs of camps, sports, excursions and other costs by making an agreement with the College.

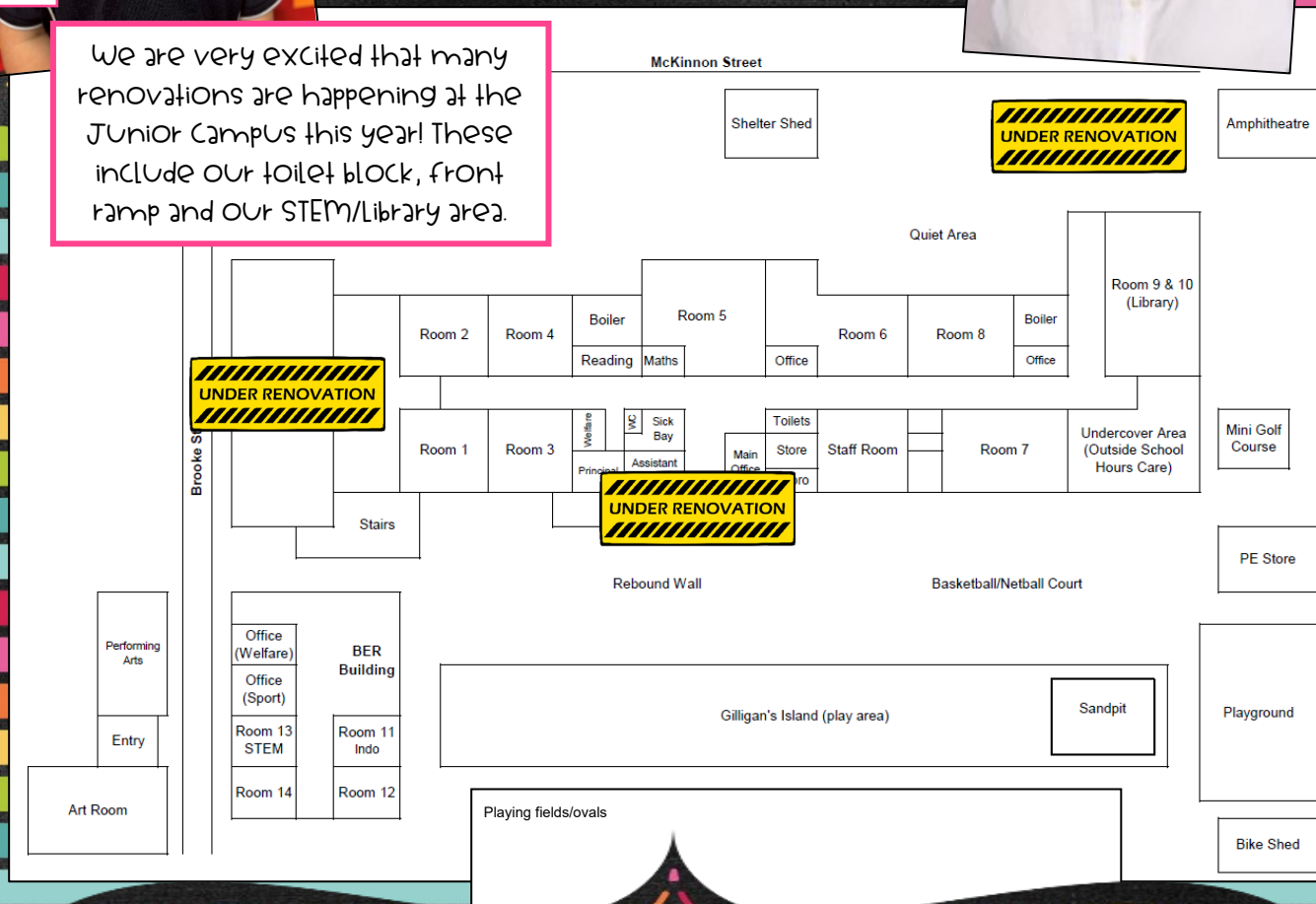

attendance and lateness:

Attendance is checked three times each day. Students who arrive late at school must sign in at the Office before they make their way to their classroom. **BEING ON TIME, EVERY DAY, READY FOR LEARNING** is the best way to ensure your child gets off to a flying start at school. As a government school, we only schedule 4 student free days in addition to school holidays.

Absence Notes:

If your child is absent from school, we ask for a note, phone call, message through Compass, or a conversation with your child's teacher. This is a legal requirement, but it also means that we are able to help monitor your child's whereabouts, an important safety consideration.

First Aid, Accidents & Ambulance Service:

The College has a well-equipped First Aid Room and trained First Aid Officers. Families complete an emergency contact form when enrolling their child. During the school year, if we consider that a student would be best served by going home, you will be contacted by the Office Manager. Should a student's problem be only minor, he/she will be kept in sick bay and monitored closely. In the event of a more serious accident or condition, you will be called as soon as possible and notified of any action we have taken. All sick bay entries are documented on Compass for our records and also to allow parents to be aware of any minor injuries throughout the school day, quickly and easily.

Academic Progress:

We are committed to providing regular feedback to our students and parents to ensure a strong link between home and school is established and maintained. Parent Teacher Interviews are held each term at the Junior Campus. In Term 1, we run these interviews early in the year which is coupled with a meet and greet barbeque for all families. This is a great opportunity to share in our strong school community. In Term 2 and Term 4, Parent Teacher Interviews convey information about your child's progress and allow teachers the opportunity to explain your child's school report that show levels of achievement against the Victorian Curriculum standards. In Term 3, a school-wide event is combined with Parent Teacher Interviews creating a celebration of the learning and growth that has occurred in many areas. Reports are given at the end of each term and these accompany a learning journal showcasing student work from the term. Parents have the opportunity to peruse these journals every holiday period to see the progression and attainment of learning goals made by your child.

Through Compass, parents also receive a brief progress report every six weeks. This snapshot shows how your child is tracking with their persistence, behaviour and respect in all classes and is valued feedback for both students and parents.
