FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK...



Two weeks already! Thank you for such a warm welcome. I am looking forward to seeing the school in action. From the look of the calendars at both campuses, it's going to be a busy term at the College!

Like all schools, Term 2 (and 3) is the term that we hope to consolidate **Student Learning** by continuing the routines of the classroom that have been set in the 'getting to know you'

phase of Term 1 – usually though there are times where it won't go to plan and **flexibility and understanding** will get us through.

At recent assemblies, I have been afforded the opportunity to briefly address the students and staff, as well as attending parents and grandparents. The key message is that I have two, simple, yet hopefully clear expectations for all within our

College community. To WONK hand be nice—all aspects of our daily lives can be brought back to these two pillars and if I am asking this of you as a student, parent and staff member, then surely you can expect the same of me. After 4 years at Kew Primary School, I moved into the independent school system and spent the next 4 years honing the craft of teaching at the Camberwell Grammar School (K-12) — esteemed in tradition and where 'The Golden Rule' of treating others as one wants to be treated was lived and breathed each and every day. Not an easy feat with a student enrolment of 1500!

Like many country youth who move away from their home town seeking adventure, we generally return back to the country life. In 2016 the role of Assistant Principal at Colac Secondary College arose and for me an opportunity to return to my core belief that every student, no matter the background or what socioeconomic status they come from, they deserve a

great start in life through education. Government education plays such an important role and should be the centrepiece and a place of coming together for all members of a country community.

As Assistant Principal for the past 7 years, my role was supporting the students to believe they can achieve by helping the College grow and develop its identity into a school that the students and community can be really proud of. Colac – we love it there. After 7 years, I now feel fully entrenched in Western Victoria. Something I never thought would happen after growing up in the Gippsland town of Leongatha, which is very similar in size to Camperdown with similar industries. And most of all, great country kids.

Country towns... we are so lucky in many ways for the opportunities that are provided to children and families, to grow together, and I'm sure the staff, parents and students have extended roles out in the local community, which I applaud and fully support. As the saying goes... It takes a village to raise... you know the rest. It's a value that I would like to continue here at Camperdown College. The Village feel in the Junior Campus by continuing to support students and families to get the best start to education and life and then continue through to the Senior Campus where the pathways to being a successful adult are nurtured and supported. I believe in rewarding students for continued effort, determination and resilience in adversity. Skills that will serve them well as adults.

Me personally: My loves outside of my family and work are the Liverpool Football Club in England (born out of living/teaching in London for four years when I was fresh out of university). Curriculum and Classroom Strategies



RELATIONSHIPS

This term, staff as a part of the Berry Street Model for Education (BSEM), are exploring the Domain of Relationships and delving into the importance of developing positive relationships with our students and the wider school community.

Think back to when you were in school. Who were your favourite teachers? And what was it about them that made being in their class so enjoyable? Chances are the teachers you most enjoyed were the ones who injected their personality, expressed their care and concern for you and who also built a classroom culture which was fun, engaging and safe.

In education, relationships are critically important as they are a key determinant of student achievement, engagement and are a protective factor in student resilience and wellbeing. When staff provide supportive, clear bonds, students are provided with the emotional safety they need to achieve success.

As humans we are hardwired for connection. Emotionally, physically, mentally and neurologically, we all depend on connections with others to grow, develop and maintain our wellbeing. We all desire acceptance, love and a sense of belonging and as a school we want to create an environment where all students experience these. We aim to provide a school community where staff form strong connections with their students through taking deliberate steps to establish trust, validation and safety.

Through building our school community we not only want our staff and students to build strong positive relationships but we also want to ensure that we are modelling these relationships so that our students can build these types of relationships with their peers. As peer relationships are an important factor in contributing to each student's school enjoyment. Relationships can exercise both powerful positive or negative influences on our lives and we want to support and encourage all of our students to develop healthy relationships that are set by clear boundaries, care, positive emotional intent, open communication and honesty.

We look forward to continuing to forge these positive relationships with our students by ensuring that we are creating an environment where all of our students can reach their academic potential, engage in their learning and feel supported to develop wellbeing and resilience.


