FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK...



As we near the end of Term 2, it is important to reflect on the wonderful accomplishments of our students and express our gratitude to the dedicated staff who have supported them along the way.

Victorian Principals Conference:

Day 1: A Gathering of Experience

Last week, I had the privilege of attending the two-day Victorian Principals Conference alongside Jacinta Tolland and other principals from across the state. The conference provided a platform for us to share insights, collaborate and explore innovative approaches to education. It was truly inspiring to hear from the likes of experienced Principal Susan Ogden from Dandenong High School and I also attended workshops on **accelerating whole school numeracy improvement**, being one of the key focus areas this year at Camperdown College.

Day 2: Metropolitan School Visit

The second day of the conference was dedicated to metropolitan school visits, I visited a P-12 College in Melbourne's west, currently with an enrolment of 3,000+ students and 450 staff – on a site not much bigger than our Senior Campus. It was a great opportunity to understand some of the pressures that metropolitan schools are currently faced with (especially finding a workforce). On the day I visited the school, they had 68 staff out with illness, COVID-19 and other reasons – a logistical nightmare I would expect and an interruption to learning would be evident. One of the classes I visited in the primary school had so far this year had 8 different class teachers, in less than 6 months. However, with so much disruption it was great to see the students calm and on task, not ideal though.

Seeing this gave me great confidence in our College's current and relatively stable situation in regard to staffing, showing a collective dedication from our educators. Like all workplaces, there are times when there is change, it's unavoidable and generally these changes happen mid-year, nonetheless we always hope to minimise the negative impact of the changes.

Ensuring Bus Safety – Buckle Up for Protection:

In light of recent bus tragedies, it is crucial that we address the importance of bus safety. I urge all students to be mindful of their safety and the safety of others whilst traveling on buses. Wearing seatbelts significantly reduces the risk of injury during accidents, and I encourage everyone to make it a habit to buckle up before the journey begins – by law if there is a seatbelt (there always should be) then you are required to use it. By prioritising bus safety, we can help create a secure environment for all our students.

Unforgettable Camp Experiences – Angahook and The Ranch:

This week, our Year 3/4 students embarked on a remarkable adventure at Angahook in Aireys Inlet. The camp provided them with a unique opportunity to bond, explore nature and

engage in various outdoor activities. Similarly, a few weeks ago, our Year 5/6 students enjoyed a fantastic camp experience at The Ranch. These camps have had a positive impact on our students, fostering resilience, teamwork and personal growth. I extend my sincere appreciation to our dedicated staff members who accompanied our students, ensuring their safety and creating memories that will last a lifetime.

Senior Exams and the GAT:

I am delighted to share the positive approach displayed by our Year 10/11 students in their exams last week. Their dedication and hard work deserve celebration. Additionally, we commend the senior students on the completion of the GAT examination on Thursday. These achievements reflect the commitment of our students to their education and their determination to excel. We congratulate them on their efforts and wish them continued success in their academic journey. Well done and thank you to the staff for their preparation and support!

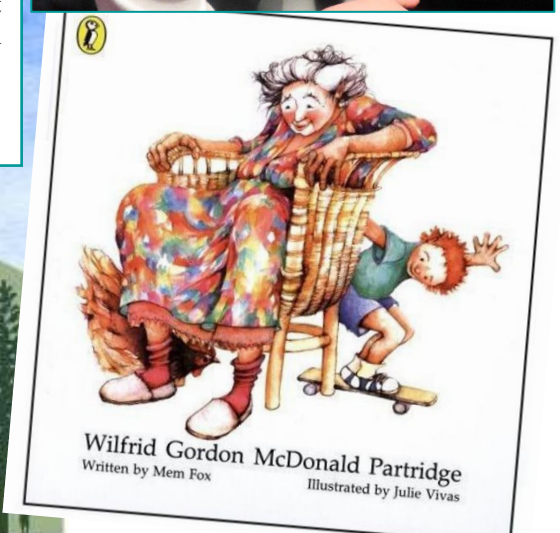
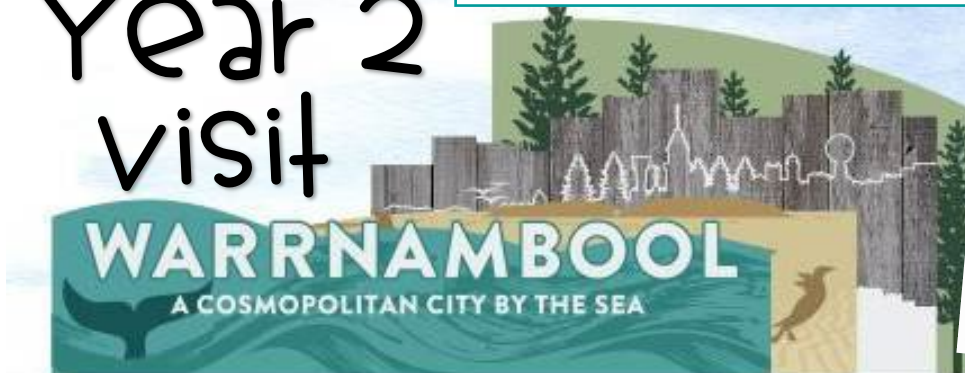

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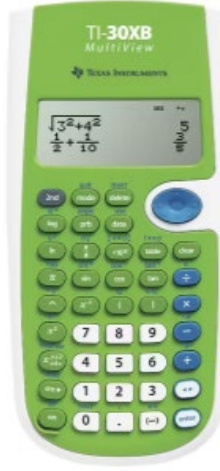
REMINDER: Calculator requirements Year 7 – 10

In recent weeks we have noticed fewer students have access to their own calculator. It is expected that all students in Year 7 – 10 have access to their **own** scientific calculator for Maths classes and they bring it with them to class each session. These calculators (see below) have a range of functions (buttons) that are required to complete their maths work. Whilst they may not use them in every session, it is expected that they take them to **all** Maths classes. The 'green' TI-30XB is the model on our booklist, but there are many different models that are suitable, and they do not require this exact model. It is possible to purchase a suitable model at the supermarket for under \$20.

Both groups followed instructions and thought strategically throughout the sessions and had a lot of fun doing so.



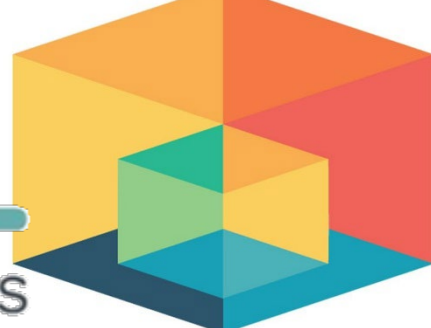
Art Room with Mrs Adams:

We had a lovely morning in the Art Room with future Year 7 students. We used Gelli plates to make prints, each student creating a print of their initial. We experimented with creating a gradient of colour using two coloured paints, rolled the paint onto the gelli mould, then placed down our cut out letters. We created the prints using coloured paper, pressing down hard before lifting off the print. We then experimented further by making a ghost print. Students worked hard and created some fantastic work. They all took home at least two finished pieces. We finished the class with a reflection with lots of students willing to participate and share their learnings.

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BERRY STREET EDUCATION MODEL

Curriculum and Classroom Strategies



As a part of our Berry Street Educational Model, staff have been examining how we give feedback and praise to our students to ensure it is a positive experience that assists them to develop their resilience.

You may have been given praise that reflects what others think of you. For example: “You are smart” or “You are very gifted”. This type of praise could have made you feel very confident and motivated to improve, however this type of praise can also have a negative effect.

Praise is an opportunity to show our students why they have succeeded. When we provide feedback based on a student’s ability, it tells them that what we value is a fixed trait. Either you have it or you don’t. This can make students feel helpless and as though they are being judged on something they have no control over. So, it is extremely important that we show our students what we really value – their effort, use of problem solving strategies and seeking help when they require assistance.

This term, our staff have been reviewing the types of praise and feedback we give to our students by exploring ‘Process Praise vs Person Praise’.

Process praise: Acknowledges the student’s effort, strategies or actions that contributed to the success of the task. For example: “You worked hard to solve that equation by using an efficient strategy”.

Person praise: The focus is on student’s individual qualities and traits. For example: “You are clever at Maths”.

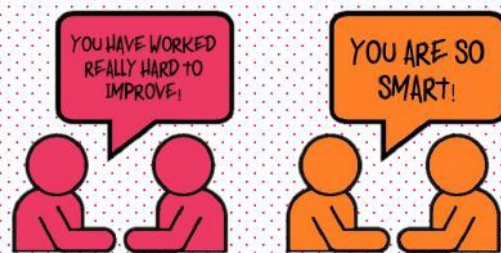
When students are given ‘person praise’ it connects their sense of self-worth to the feedback they receive so when they get positive feedback it makes them feel good about themselves; but when it is negative, they feel bad about themselves. It demonstrates to them that when they make a mistake, they are not smart, which can lead them to feel a sense of hopelessness. This is not our aim!

Process praise emphasises a students’ effort or use of a strategy, which is more likely to develop resilient responses after negative or constructive feedback has been received. Students can still feel positive emotions even after making a mistake because their value or character traits haven’t been judged. It’s all about their process, not them as a person.

We aim to ensure that the feedback we are giving our students aligns with process praise. We are currently working towards basing all of our student awards and chronicle entries on this specific type of praise. Because after all, we need to make mistakes in order to learn!
