The Camperdown College Hockey 7's - Primary Team, were the winners of the Division Hockey Competition that was held on Friday 21st July in Warrnambool. The winning team consisted of Henry Wilkinson, Noah Boyd, Max Rahles-Rahbula, Isla Spokes, Amber Wallis, Sam Tolland, Bailey Carmen, Nathan Wilson and Lawson Clark.

We were very proud of the effort and sportsmanship displayed by all the students throughout the competition. It was a very successful day with the team not losing a single game. We played Our Lady Help of Christians, St Josephs Primary School, Cobden Primary School, Grassmere Primary School, Woodford Primary School before finally defeating the defending champions, Warrnambool East Primary School, 5-2 in the Grand Final.

The competition was open to all schools in the area with the winners progressing onto the regional finals. This style of competition is a faster paced game and higher scoring than regular hockey, with games being played on reduced space (across the field), using internationally certified rebound walls and with reduced numbers of seven players on the field at one time. Rules were also modified to accommodate the reduction in space and players to ensure safety and flow of the game.

We would like to thank Hockey Southwest for hosting the event and all the umpires for the day. We would also like to thank Amelia Robertson for running training sessions prior to the competition and of course our super coach Taj Cunningham. What a positive role model you were to our young hockey stars! Congratulations to our players. We are so proud of you all!

NAPLAN:

A huge congratulations goes to all the students, parents and staff for the wonderful 2023 NAPLAN results. This shows a strong supported learning culture within the home through parent engagement in learning, in the classroom through great teaching and significant effort from all students involved.

NAPLAN this year was held in Term 1 and the data that schools now receive is slightly different from years past, with students now classified into 1 of 4 Proficiency Levels of *Needs Additional Support*, *Developing*, *Strong* and *Exceeding* as the highest rank. There are 20 different categories through 5 areas of Reading, Writing, Spelling, Grammar & Punctuation and Numeracy across Year 3, 5, 7 and 9. Camperdown College exceeded the results on Similar (demographically across the state) and Network (local) schools in 15 out of the 20 categories. *Camperdown College can be truly proud of this year's NAPLAN results*.

Puffer Jackets:

The eagerly awaited puffer jackets are now available for fitting. Jackets that range from 4XS-5XL (\$60) and are suggested sizes for:

- Senior Campus: 2XS 5XL.
- The Junior Campus has 2 different styles of jackets available for pre-order. These puffer jackets will be either \$60 or \$65, depending on the size required. The \$60 style, like the Senior Campus, are more suited to Year 2 6 students and start at a 4XS. We have the 3XS and 4XS options to try on at the Junior Campus Office, larger sizes will need to head to the Senior Campus for fittings. The \$65 style is more suited to Prep Year 2 students in sizes K6 and K8 we have a K8 to try on, however there is a slight delay on these items.

Annual Parent/Caregiver Survey:

Camperdown College is conducting a survey to find out what parents/caregivers think of our school. The Parent/Caregiver Survey is an annual survey offered by the Department of Education that is designed to assist schools in gaining an understanding of families' perceptions of school climate, student behaviour, and student engagement. The survey is optional; nonetheless, we encourage all families to participate. Our school will use the survey results to help inform and direct future school planning and improvement strategies.

Each year we conduct 3 major surveys:

- Parent/Caregiver Survey
- Student Survey (Attitudes to School)
- Staff Survey

All parents/caregivers are invited to participate in this year's survey. Lookout for the email/Compass notification as it is completed online.

The Parent/Caregiver Survey will be open from **Monday** 7th **August to Friday** 8th **September 2023.** As mentioned above, the survey will be conducted online, only takes about 20 minutes to complete and can be accessed at any convenient time within the survey period on desktop computers, laptops, tablets or smartphones.

SENIOR CAMPUS NEWS



Koorie Career Day:

I had the pleasure of accompanying students to the Koorie Career Day at Warrnambool College last week. The students heard from a range of presenters about their career paths and engaged with a variety of pathway providers in a range of activities. The day was very informative and provided students with future pathway aspirations. Congratulations to Rory Harrison and Lucinda Evans who both won vouchers on the day for their contributions and participation. I received the following email from the Area Executive Director about our students: The young students you had with you were particularly dedicated and displayed exemplary behaviour and engagement with the sessions and tasks. A credit to you and the school also.

100 days of Prep:

Year 12 students enjoyed their visit to the Junior Campus today to join in with the 100 days of Prep celebrations. The students prepared gift bags for each of their buddies that contain a range of messages – *Included in this bag is: A book to show your buddy how good you have become at reading; a bookmark to help you keep your place; an eraser because it is ok to make mistakes; a sharpener to keep you 'sharp' as a learner; a pencil and paper to record your dreams and some smarties because you are 100 days smarter.*

Pathway Information Session and Career Action Planning:

Planning is underway for students in Year 9 - 12 for their programs for 2024. A series of information sessions for specific year levels was held on Wednesday evening to explain the pathway choices students have in their later years of schooling.

Year 9 students were informed about the opportunity to complete a Step Up VCE subject, a VET course or begin a School Based Apprenticeship whilst in Year 10.

Year 10 students were exposed to the two courses they can select from in Year 11/12 – Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) or the VCE Vocational Major. Students have received an initial selection sheet, and this is to be submitted by next Friday 11th August.

Year 12 students and their parents were taken through the process of how the ATAR is calculated, applying for university courses and how to apply to the Special Entry Access Scheme (SEAS) which is available to all rural students.

Thank you to Mr Van for conducting these sessions.

Year 10 Work Experience:

Year 10 students got to experience a range of careers last week throughout our region. For many students, this experience helped to cement their future career aspirations; for others, the experience confirmed they needed to explore other avenues. Feedback from employers was very positive regarding our students' attitude, initiative, and communication skills.

Vocational Major Projects:

Year 12 VM Junior Campus Disco:

Year 12 VM students organised a very successful disco which was extremely well supported by the Junior Campus students. The students were very impressed with the effort parents went to in order to dress their children in fluorescent disco gear. In addition to this, they were impressed with the dance skills. A number of prizes were handed out on the night for the students' dance skills and some year levels prizes were awarded to students at assembly today. Money raised from the disco will fund a healthy lunch campaign led by the VM students.

Year 11 VM Bike Shelter:

After several students expressed disappointment that their bikes are exposed to the elements during the school day, the Year 11 VM students decided to take action. They are in the process of building a shelter near the ramp entrance from Errey Street. The students initially erected a fence which will act as the side partition and this week added the roof trusses.

Uniform Policy - new jackets added:

At last month's School Council meeting, changes were made to the current Uniform policy. A navy puffer jacket with the College emblem has been added. There are sample sizes currently available for students to try on. Orders for the jackets will be available online shortly. Information regarding this will be posted through Compass.

Leadership Conference:

Early in the school year, School Captains Ruby Walsh and Selvia Suson, attended a leadership conference in Melbourne. Using this as impetus, they are currently organising leadership sessions for students in Year 7 – 12. These will be held on Friday 18th August. Students will hear from motivational speakers and participate in a range of activities to inspire them to take up leadership options.

Torres Strait Islander Flag Raising:

Next Wednesday 9th August, we will be raising the Torres Strait Islander flag for the first time as part of World Indigenous Peoples' Day. Some of our Indigenous students will be conducting the ceremony which will also include a smoking ceremony by an Indigenous Elder. Parents are welcome to attend. The ceremony will commence at 11.30am.


The Girls as Leaders in STEM (GALS) program within Deakin's School of Education is committed to fostering young girls' interest in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) and equipping them with the skills they need for the jobs of the future.

On Thursday 27th July, the GALS team (Isla Spokes, Sophie Wilson, Abey McLachlan and Emily Wood) travelled to Deakin University in Warrnambool to participate in the GALS (Girls as Leaders in STEM) program. First of all, we sat in a lecture theatre for university students where we learnt all about the program and what we had to do. It was a very fun day; we learnt lots about rubbish pollution in Australia and then talked with the leaders of the program about our project, an 'Inclusive Environment.'

We were taken on a small tour of Deakin University and saw the first hydrogen research and development facility in Australia. This is where they are testing how to make hydrogen fuel cells and convert them to electricity that can then be used to power vehicles. This was very interesting, and we were able to hold and be informed about the different types of pipes that are being used for this project.

Make sure you keep an eye around the school to see where we will be working on our project in the coming terms.

Basketball:



Curriculum and Classroom Strategies

Building positive, respectful relationships is a pillar of educational success – for teachers and for students. At Camperdown College, we endeavour to foster these relationships at every opportunity. One way in which we can do that, is by responding in appropriate ways to **good** news.

As part of our Berry Street Training, we examined a study conducted by Shelly Gable and her team at the University of California. Their findings indicated that responses to good news could be categorised in four different ways:

- Leading Active Constructive, in which the respondents ask questions and congratulate;
- **1.** Passive Constructive, in which the respondents congratulate but do not elaborate;
- 3. Active Destructive, in which the respondents draw attention to negative aspects of the good news, and
- **1.** Passive Destructive, in which respondents ignored the good news altogether. The diagram below provides examples of each way of responding.

ACTIVE CONSTRUCTIVE RESPONDING

	DESTRUCTIVE	CONSTRUCTIVE
ACTIVE	Deflates good news / Raises Alarm	Genuine interest / Amplifies the experience
PASSIVE	Ignores the event / Steals the conversation	Understated support / Conversation stalls

Only Active Constructive responses led to an increase in daily positive affect, satisfaction with life, and overall wellbeing, above and beyond the impact of the positive event itself, and was a factor in building relationship quality (Gable et. Al., 2004). This research has guided the recent interactions between students and staff at Camperdown College and we encourage you to try this at home too!

Additionally, positive emotion in students boosts creativity and the ability to retain information (Fredrickson, 2001) – very handy when attempting to learn and retain new information! As such, it's important for us to teach students how to reflect and capitalize on their positive memories, and Active Constructive responding is an excellent, easy to understand structure for doing so.
