

International Day of the World's Indigenous Peoples on Wednesday 9th August, was celebrated this year with a special ceremony held at each campus. Local Gunditimara and Kirrae Whurrong man, Lee Morgan conducted a Welcome to Country and performed his original song, Reconciliation Song. Students joined in the chorus with the phrases, walk with me... talk with me... take my hand, providing a strong message about growth, healing and coming together and showing respect for each other.

At the Senior Campus, Indigenous students, Rory Harrison and Limariyah Johnson proudly led the Acknowledgement of Country and provided an explanation about the origins of the Torres Strait Islander flag which was then unveiled for the first time by Isabelle Foster. The ceremony concluded with a smoking ceremony conducted by Lee, where students were encouraged to think about renewal and each day being better than the previous.

At the Junior Campus, a similar format was followed, led by School Pride leaders, Chloe Castle and Charlie Unwin. A point of difference was, each class wrote and read their own Acknowledgement of Country. The Acknowledgements included the students' appreciation for the care given by our First Nations People for the local landmarks, specific flora and fauna and a commitment to looking after these. The Torres Strait Islander flag was hoisted and students celebrated the fact they had sold Zooper Doopers to raise funds to purchase the flagpole to display this flag.

Parent Opinion Survey:

Many families will have received notification that they have been randomly selected to participate in the 2023 Parent Opinion Survey. This annual survey offered by the Department of Education and Training is conducted amongst a sample of randomly selected parents and all responses to the survey are anonymous. The assistance of

families in completing the survey based on their experiences and perceptions of Camperdown College over the past year is greatly appreciated.

The Parent Opinion Survey helps us to gain an understanding of parents' perceptions of school climate, student behaviour and student engagement. We use the survey results to help inform and direct future school planning and improvement strategies.

The survey will be conducted online **between Monday** 7^{th} **August** and **Friday** 8^{th} **September 2023**, only takes 10-15 minutes to complete, and can be accessed at any convenient time within this period on desktop computers, laptops, tablets or smartphones.

The survey results will be reported back to our school at the end of September and a summary of the results will be shared through the school newsletter. We thank you for your participation and feedback.

Staff are currently surveying students about their classroom experiences using the PIVOT surveying tool. This is the second time this survey has been conducted this year and will provide teachers with valuable feedback on their classroom environment and identify areas of strength and areas to improve upon.

Progress Reports and Parent Teacher Interviews:

Progress reports have been uploaded to Compass today. The results from these will provide a wonderful opportunity for families to discuss at Parent Teacher Interviews, which will be conducted in week 8, Tuesday 5th September. Bookings for these will open on Compass on Monday. The interviews will run from 1.30pm until 6.30pm, with a half hour break at 4pm. Students who reside in town will be dismissed at lunchtime. Bus travellers will also be encouraged to leave at lunchtime if travel home can be arranged.

Mysic exam success



2023 jean wood music award



Curriculum and Classroom Strategies

DE-ESCALATION:

De-escalation refers to the process of calming or diffusing a situation or conflict before it escalates. De-escalation is an important skill to learn, as we can all feel overwhelmed and angry at times but by being able to learn how to recognise our emotions, identify our needs and actively use strategies to de-escalate, in a safe and appropriate manner, we can become present, centred and grounded individuals.

De-escalating situations is not an easy skill to learn as it requires multiple opportunities to practice and a toolbox of different strategies. Not every strategy is going to work for every student and a particular strategy might not work every time. We need to have a toolbox full of strategies, to see what works in that moment.

We all know that challenging behaviours are likely to occur. Most of these behaviours occur because of a particular reason, even if we can't see or understand the reason in that moment. Students might feel overwhelmed, frustrated, or worried about something. How we choose to respond to those moments can make a huge impact on our students. We can choose to engage in those situations or conflicts, or we can offer our help to de-escalate the situation.

Through the Berry Street Education Model staff have actively been working with our students to learn how to recognise and name their emotions, provide support to help them to regulate these emotions through the use of de-escalation strategies. This could look like de-escalating Brain Breaks, checking in with our students using the Ready to Learn Scales and students' Ready to Learn Plans.

Here are some examples of de-escalating strategies, that assist our students to regulate their emotions.

Just One Minute

Set a timer for one minute.
What can you see?
What can you hear?
What can you smel?
What can you touch?
Concentrate and focus
ONLY on what's happening
right now.

Five things you see.
Four things you feel.
Three things you hear.
Two things you smell
One thing you taste.


Tabletop Push Ups


Use a sturdy table or surface.



11 Ingredients

5 Method Steps

- 1/2 small avocado, thinly
- 1 iceberg lettuce leaf, finely shredded
- 1/2 small red capsicum. finely sliced

Tuna and celery filling

- 1/2 celery stalk, finely chopped
- ② tbsp whole-egg mayonnaise

Chicken and corn filling

- ① 1/2 cup finely chopped cooked chicken
- 125g can creamed corn
- 1 tbsp finely chopped chives
- Select all ingredients

Make tuna and celery filling Combine tuna, celery and mayonnaise in a bowl.

Make chicken and corn filling Combine chicken, corn and chives in a bowl.

Step 3

Place bread on a flat surface. Using a rolling pin, flatten bread slightly. Lightly spread margarine over 1 side of each bread slice. Spread tuna filling over 4 slices, leaving a 2cm strip along top edge. Top with avocado. Roll up to enclose filling. Cut each sandwich into 3 rounds.

Step 4

Spread chicken filling over remaining 4 slices, leaving a 2cm strip along opposite edge. Top with lettuce and capsicum. Roll up to enclose filling. Cut each sandwich into 3 rounds.

Step 5

Wrap sandwiches tightly in plastic wrap. Refrigerate until required. Serve.
