FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK...

At Camperdown College, we are incredibly grateful for the ongoing support of our parent community. One of the many ways this support is shown is through voluntary financial contributions, which help us continue to offer an enriching and diverse educational experience for all our students.

At last week's School Council meeting, members suggested I take a moment to highlight just how important these contributions are to the life of our school.

While these contributions are completely voluntary, schools must follow strict Department of Education guidelines about how they are requested. For instance, we are not permitted to send account statements or approach families in any other way for payment. However, we can display contribution options via Compass, where you'll find them listed in the Payment Centre. Since the Department made all parent contributions voluntary, they have also placed significant expectations on schools to continue offering the same high-quality programs - and we've proudly continued to meet that expectation. However, in this current financial climate parent support is more important than ever.

I must acknowledge that we receive funding to operate our school and we use this to run our programs, subsidise camps and excursions to keep them affordable for all and plan improvements across both campuses. Over many years, we've carefully budgeted to update the Junior Campus and we are currently setting aside funds to further update its furniture and

fencing. At the Senior Campus, we're also planning to build another technology space - exciting developments that your support helps make possible.

We understand that times are tough, and many families are feeling the impact of rising living costs. Our school is not immune to these pressures, with the costs of materials, equipment and resources steadily increasing—particularly in hands-on and elective subjects such as Technology, Science, The Arts and Food Studies. These subjects are not only engaging and inspiring for students but are also vital in developing practical skills and creativity.

Voluntary parent contributions play a key role in enabling us to continue providing a wide range of these high-quality programs. Your support helps ensure our students enjoy access to the best possible learning experiences.

Last week, we celebrated Book Week for another year with the theme *Book an Adventure* guiding a superb Book Week parade on Tuesday. Mrs Murphy organised the most wonderful, immersive Book Week parade

that saw all attendees feel like passengers aboard a flight full of onboard entertainment including books read by special guests. Costumes were on full show as students paraded around the aeroplane in front of many family, friends and peers. Thanks to Mrs Murphy for a wonderful experience. We appreciate the work that went into the parade.

Hooptime Basketball:

Today, our Year 3/4 Rookies ventured to the Camperdown Stadium to compete against other local schools in mini games of basketball rounding out a successful Hooptime Basketball competition that has occurred over the past four Fridays this term. Last week, our Year 3/4 All Stars team had a very successful day of competition in Terang, winning the grand final and progressing to the next round of competition on Monday 20th October, joining our Year 5/6 All Star winning team who also qualified for the Regional competition on Monday 27th October after also taking out the competition for Year 5/6 males earlier this term.

Junior Campus Renovations:

Over the past fortnight, we have seen continued progression with our renovations, with more classrooms painted, new furniture moved into classrooms and spaces rejuvenated with new wall furnishings. Our Prep and Year 1 classrooms have been the latest areas to receive this treatment, with students showing exceptional flexibility by learning in different parts of the school and in combined classes. Our Library/STEM area and Year 5/6 classrooms received their long-awaited new furniture this week. This furniture looks clean and modern and ensures our students are learning in comfortable and appealing settings.

We are on track to have the entire main building painted internally and new flooring installed by the start of Term 4 and we thank staff, students and families for their adaptability during this renovation stage.

Junior Campus Concert:

Work is beginning behind the scenes in preparation for our 2025 Junior Campus Concert scheduled for Thursday 18th September (last week of term). This night is always a highlight of the year so please put this event on your calendars. Rehearsals have begun and we can't wait for these performances to strengthen in the lead up to the concert in just a few weeks!

Progress Reports:

Progress reports were made live yesterday for students and families on Compass. These reports are a quick snapshot of how your child is tracking in the key attributes of persistence, behaviour and respect in all classes, including specialist classes. This is an important report, that is presented in graph form and accessed via the *Reports* tab on Compass, that we encourage families to view and discuss with their child. This is an important way to receive feedback from our specialist teachers who see your child on a weekly basis.

Father's Day:

Next Friday, we will be celebrating our dads/special people with our Parents & Friends breakfast in the BER at the Junior Campus. We hope many of our dads/special people are able to join us to recognise Father's Day. Our students will also be able to purchase a gift for dad at our Father's Day Stall. Donations for our stall can be dropped off to the Junior Campus office before Wednesday 3rd September.

Glasses for Kids (Prep – Year 3):

A reminder for families of Prep – Year 3 students to complete the consent form on Compass for the Glasses for Kids program if they haven't already done so. This program completes initial vision screens and, if required, will provide eye testing and glasses at no cost to families and is available to all students. Students who currently wear glasses can still be a part of this program, gaining an additional pair of glasses at no cost. If required, students can choose their glasses, be fitted with them on the day with the fitted pair of glasses being sent to the school within a few weeks of the visit. This is a wonderful opportunity, and we strongly encourage all families to support this initiative.

Lions Eye Testing (Year 4 and 6):

A reminder that our Year 4 and 6 students have the opportunity to have their eyes tested by a group of volunteers from the Camperdown Lions Club next Monday 1St September. Information was sent home with students earlier this term with consent forms due back at school by today, Friday 29th August.

Parent Teacher Interviews, Art Show and Scholastic Book Fair:

On Tuesday 9th September, we will be hosting our check-in Parent Teacher Interviews alongside our Art Show and Scholastic Book Fair. These short, 5 minute conferences are an opportunity for parents and teachers to *check-in* face-to-face to ensure student growth and progress is shared and further goals explored, as we near the end of another term. During these conferences, our students' art from the year will be on show for perusal. These conferences will be held in the BER (and not classrooms) along with our art show. Bookings are open on Compass with bookings available between 3.30pm – 5.30pm.

Our Scholastic Book Fair will also be available on the night (in the library), with this open to families from Monday 8th September. The book fair is an opportunity for students to purchase books, posters and book paraphernalia directly, while raising funds for our school.

The book fair will be open to students and families every night between Monday 8th September – Friday 12th September, 3.30pm – 4.30pm. *Please note, on Tuesday 9th September, the Scholastic Book Fair will be open for the full two-hours of the Parent Teacher Interviews and Art Show.*

For a short term, we are certainly packing a lot in! As we pass the halfway point there are wonderful events to review and exciting things to look forward to. Over the fortnight we have had students travel to Melbourne, Geelong, Port Campbell and locally here in Camperdown. What is so very pleasing (but not surprising), are the **reports from venues, event organisers and members of the public alike about just how beautifully behaved our students are**. They live the school values which are a focus of homegroups each week and display exemplary behaviour. It fills our teachers with pride to be stopped by members of the public, in venues such as the National Gallery of Victoria (NGV) and be told how respectful our students are. While we sometimes support students at school in practising our values, it's incredibly rewarding to see them embrace these opportunities in the wider community and demonstrate, through their actions, that they truly value them.



Our Year 9/10 Art Elective and some Year 8 High Ability students visited the French Impressionism exhibition at the NGV last Friday, followed by time at ACMI. Leaving before school on a bus driven by

Tim Keane, the students travelled with Mrs Mann and were able to really soak in the work of masters at the gallery after attending an education session. While all were pleased to be home, there were no complaints about the 6pm arrival back at school – it was such a positive experience, and one that made many teachers jealous!

This week, a group of Year 11/12 students travelled by train (an early start!) to participate in the P.A.R.T.Y Program. The Prevent Alcohol and Risk-Related Trauma in Youth (P.A.R.T.Y) Program provides a unique experience for young people across Victoria and we are lucky that teachers like Mrs Sue Maskell chase down these opportunities for our students. The program aims to provide participants with information that will

enable them to recognise potential injury-producing situations, make prevention-oriented choices and adopt behaviours that minimise unnecessary risk. At The Alfred hospital, participants engage with paramedics, doctors, nurses, allied health practitioners, patients and their families in the hospital through a combination of classroom-based information delivery, interactive scenario-based learning and proactive demonstrations.

On the same day, a group of Year 10/11 students went to Port Campbell with Ms Kate Wells on a program facilitated by the Neil Porter Legacy foundation. The focus for the day was to interact with **local industry** to learn about what happens at a gas plant, the environmental work they do and different roles including managers, engagements specialist.

Locally we have had Year 12 VM students visit the Junior Campus on Tuesday to run lunchtime activities. They have enjoyed games of *Octopus* and participated in arts and crafts – with some of our Year 12 students being schooled in staying in the lines when colouring! It is heart warming to see our oldest students head across to the Junior Campus (armed with umbrellas in the rain!) to spend time with some of the youngest members at our school in these, there last few weeks of school themselves.

Zack and Lewis Reagan spoke with the Camperdown Quilter's group, sharing their experiences of their Kokoda trek as well.

Here at school the library continued to be the place to be. The introduction of **Lego** at break times has been a hit, with Linda Morgan officiating in a building competition. Congratulations to Grace Magilton for her construction of an orangutan.

Today was Wear It Purple Day at the Senior Campus. Wear It Purple is committed to empowering rainbow (sex, sexuality and gender diverse) young people to have a voice in creating a more inclusive culture. Wear It Purple was founded in 2010 by students wanting to take a stand after hearing so many LGBQTIA+ students taking their lives due to bullying and harassment. United by the belief that everybody has the right to be proud of who they are and who they are becoming, Wear It Purple is raising awareness and, in the process, creating a more inclusive, safe, and empowered environment for the rainbow community. Purple ribbons were available at the library if students wanted to show their support of the cause.

The next round of **GPAs** are now live to families and students. These can be accessed on the *Reports* tab on Compass. These outline students' achievements in the learning attributes of Persistence, Behaviour and Preparation and Organisation. It is a valuable snapshot of how students are travelling. Families are invited to make a time at our upcoming Parent Teacher Interviews (PTIs), if you would like to discuss these results with individual teachers. The PTIs will be held on Tuesday 16th September from 2.30pm – 6.30pm (30 minute break 3.45pm – 4.15pm), booking for this will be also available on Compass. If you are unable to make a time with a particular teacher, please contact the office and we can arrange an opportunity for you to get feedback from them via an alternative mode.

We would also like to remind families and students that there is no supervision at school until 8.35am in the morning, therefore we ask that no students are on site before this time (unless you are a Year 12 student attending before school classes). Thanks to the teachers offering these opportunities as we get closer to exams. Also, while we believe it is important that students are at school every day, it is important for everyone's health, if students stay home if they are unwell. Coming with symptoms such as coughs and sore throats can mean peers are also impacted with the bugs that are about in our community at the moment. We thank you for your support in these matters.



Our Year 6 GALS team returned to Deakin in Warrnambool for their third workshop day on Tuesday 26th August. The focus of the day was communication, an essential skill for presenting their ideas confidently and clearly.

The girls explored strategies to help calm their nerves before and during presentations, which will be especially useful when speaking in front of an audience. They also learnt about the importance of microphone placement to ensure their voices are heard properly when presenting. A fun and interesting part of the day involved a decibel reader activity, where students read a short passage from Harry Potter. This helped to see how loud their voices were and what adjustments they might need to make to speak at an appropriate volume. After lunch, the girls had the privilege of hearing from Emily and Zoe, two scientists from Deakin University. They shared their inspiring stories and experiences as women in STEM, giving them insight into their work and the exciting opportunities in science careers. The girls then got creative with a hands-on activity where they had to design artwork inspired by seaweed. As part of the experience, they even got to taste a piece of seaweed—although none of them really liked it! It was very salty, but definitely a memorable moment.

This workshop was another engaging and informative workshop and students are looking forward to putting our new communication skills into practice!

Taking a stand against bullying...

On Wednesday 13th August, our Senior Campus proudly took part in *Bully Zero's Day of Action* as part of National Bullying Prevention Week. This important event gave our school community the opportunity to take real and visible action against bullying. Students and staff came together in a spirit of unity and fun, participating in a lively dance off that brought smiles, laughter and a powerful message of inclusion and respect. In addition, everyone took part in the *Hands Up for Action* activity, a symbolic gesture reinforcing our commitment to creating a safe and supportive environment for all. Events like these remind us that every action, no matter how small, can make a big difference. Together, we are building a culture where bullying is not tolerated and where every student feels seen, heard and valued

Understanding bullying and its impact:

Bullying is an ongoing or repeated misuse of power in relationships, intended to cause deliberate psychological harm. These behaviours can be verbal, physical or social and may occur in person or online, across various digital platforms and devices. Bullying can be obvious or subtle, but regardless of how it presents, it can have immediate, medium, and long-term effects on everyone involved — including bystanders. Despite significant efforts to reduce bullying in schools and communities, research shows that one in four students still report being bullied every few weeks. It's important to understand however, that not all negative interactions should be classified as bullying. The key difference is that bullying does not stop on its own and it involves a power imbalance. To help young people navigate social challenges, it's essential they learn how to distinguish between:


- Rude behaviour accidental or thoughtless actions.
- Mean behaviour hurtful actions done on purpose but only once.
- Bullying intentional, repeated harm with an imbalance of power.

Why do some young people bully?

The reasons behind bullying can be complex. Some young people may:

- Seek approval or attention from peers.
- Try to regain a sense of control or power in their own lives.
- Feel insecure or unsafe and act out as a form of self-protection.

Understanding these motivations can help adults guide young people in addressing their feelings and behaviours in a constructive way.



As our school library has recently been renovated, we're downsizing and donating books to children supported by the *Kids for Cows Foundation* in Cambodia. To transport these books, we're seeking **donations of wheeled suitcases**—new or used in good condition.

Kids for Cows is a 100% volunteer-run charity and 100% of funds go to children living in poverty—primarily in Siem Reap and surrounding areas. Through fundraising and cattle agistment, we provide support in the form of education, school supplies, sporting goods, clothing, and rice. Some of our recent achievements include:

- Rebuilding a second home and supporting a local orphanage with supplies and a part-time English teacher.
- Renovating and opening a school in Veal village with over 100 children now learning English.
- Building/renovating five homes in the Kampong Plok lake community.



Trauma in Youth

Students in Year 11/12 travelled to Melbourne yesterday to spend time at the Alfred hospital taking part in the invaluable P.A.R.T.Y program. The P.A.R.T.Y program is a dynamic and interactive injury awareness and prevention program which utilises true stories and experiences to demonstrate the impact of injury. Students engaged with paramedics, doctors, nurses, allied health practitioners, patients and their families in the hospital, offsite and in an online setting. This program provided our students with an authentic experience of creating insight into the consequences that patients and their families are faced with as a result of risk-related trauma. Learning occurred through a combination of classroom-based information delivery, interactive scenario based learning and proactive demonstrations via face-to-face within the hospital departments. Our students enjoyed today's excursion, left the Alfred with lots to think about and represented our college with pride.



Five enthusiastic students yesterday took part in an Industry Energy Careers Day, proudly coordinated by the Neil Porter Legacy. The day gave students a unique opportunity to step inside the world of energy production and learn directly from local experts.

The event featured three engaging workshops hosted by leading companies in the region — Beach Energy, Amplitude Energy and Lochard Energy. Each session highlighted a different part of the industry, from how natural gas is formed deep beneath the earth, to the advanced processes used to bring it safely to the surface and the important role energy plays in powering our communities. Students particularly valued the hands-on experiences provided throughout the day. They explored real facilities, saw the technology in action and even gained practical insights into daily operations at local energy plants. This rare opportunity allowed them to connect classroom learning with real-world applications.

More than just a careers day, the program opened students' eyes to the variety of pathways available in the energy sector, from engineering and environmental management to safety and operations. The Neil Porter Legacy continues to create opportunities that inspire young people and strengthen connections between schools and industry. This event was a great example of that vision in action.

Menstruating isn't a choice, but those experiencing period poverty often must choose between purchasing period products or other essential items just to get by. They shouldn't have to choose... Some women and girls across Australia are doing it tough dealing with things like domestic violence, homeless and struggling financially. 64% can't afford period products and spending \$15 a month and for many, that's too much when essentials like food and rent come first. The last thing on their mind should be dealing with their period.

That's why we have made reusable fabric bags and filled them with essential sanitary products like tampons, pads, shampoo, conditioner, toothpaste, toothbrushes, deodorant and soap. These small items make a big difference.

Thanks to amazing help from Lyn Crook, we've been able to donate these bags through registered welfare agencies to people in the Corangamite Shire to be distributed. In addition, thanks to Ruby Fryers, Jada Mahony and Rebecca Johnson helping me to fill the bags and make posters around the school to inform students about Share the Dignity program.

When it comes to risk taking behaviours, we know that it takes a multi-pronged approach to support young people. Supply, Demand and Education
