




POMBO CRICKET CLINICS

VET & Careers Tip of the Week

Build your network early!

Start connecting with employers, mentors and industry professionals during your VET placement or work experience. A good impression and genuine curiosity can open doors to future job offers, apprenticeships, or references — sometimes it's *who you know* as much as *what you know!*



* FutureME – Deakin Engagement & Access Program:

FutureME is a three-day career and employability immersion program primarily for Year 9 students, run through Deakin's Engagement and Access Program (DEAP). On Friday 17th October, our Year 9 students explored the rapidly changing world of work and the skills needed for the future — building their confidence through interactions with industry professionals, hands-on experiences on Deakin's campus, group discussions and reflective exercises. The program helps students envision their own career paths, develop communication and presentation skills and understand what employers and industries are looking for now and in coming years.

Eight Year 9 students then attended the FutureMe program at Deakin University in Warrnambool the week after. The day had a focus on employability skills, in particular communication skills. The students planned a series of interview questions and then practiced their skills in a Speed Interviewing session – having the opportunity to ask a group of volunteers from education and industry settings questions about their career lives.

Social media age restrictions - what does it mean for your family.

Families, educators and mental health professionals have been requesting government assistance in helping to keep our young people safe online. This had led to the government initiating a social media age restriction initiative. These restrictions come into effect on Wednesday 10th December 2025. Social media age restrictions exist for several important reasons — mainly to protect young people's safety, privacy, and mental health.

- Social media can expose children to **pressure to compare themselves to others**, unrealistic beauty standards and cyberbullying.
- Studies have linked heavy social media use among teens to higher rates of anxiety, depression and poor self-esteem.
- Many platforms collect personal data, track behaviour and show targeted ads.
- Children often don't fully understand what it means to share personal information online or the long-term consequences of doing so.
- Social media platforms are filled with content not suitable for children—violence, hate speech, misinformation, or sexual material.
- Younger children may not recognise grooming, scams or manipulative behavior, so restrictions act as a protective barrier.
- Limiting access until a certain age encourages kids to build real-world social and communication skills first.

In short: social media age restrictions are not just about control — they're about protection and development. They aim to create a safer, more age-appropriate online experience until young users are mature enough to navigate it responsibly. The eSafety Commission has produced some great resources for families and young people to help navigate this change. They have developed the esafety Commissioner's Social Media Age Restriction Hub.



The hub is a central, easy-to-use guide that lists current minimum age requirements and age-related guidance for popular social media platforms and apps. It helps parents quickly check which services have age limits, what those limits mean, and where to find platform-specific safety settings.

Practical steps to take today:

- Check the hub for each app your child uses.
- Enable strong privacy settings and parental controls on devices and apps.
- Create clear family rules (time limits, privacy, who they can talk to).
- Keep devices in shared spaces and have regular check-ins about online experiences.
