FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK...

At Camperdown College, we may be a relatively small school, but we certainly receive our lion's share of recognition on the state stage. Time and time again, our students demonstrate that size is no barrier to excellence. Their achievements continue to make us exceptionally proud and highlight the strength of our programs, our culture and our commitment to meeting - and exceeding - state standards.

Most recently, we celebrated a remarkable individual achievement. Lucinda Evans was nominated for, and awarded, the Victorian School-Based Trainee of the Year. The ceremony, held at the Melbourne Town Hall last Wednesday evening, was attended by Warren Attrill on behalf of Camperdown College due to a clash with the Year 12 Formal. Lucinda received this honour in recognition of her dedication and outstanding achievements while completing her Certificate III in Early Childhood Education through South West TAFE. Working one day a week with the Corangamite Shire, she embraced her traineeship with maturity, enthusiasm and a genuine passion for working with children. Her success highlights the strong vocational pathways we offer and the high expectations we uphold.

Our students are also excelling in the sporting arena. This year, several individuals qualified for State level competition in athletics, lawn bowls, equestrian and cross country at both the Junior and Senior Campus, showcasing their determination, sportsmanship and commitment to personal improvement. In addition, our Year 7/8 mixed hockey team and Senior Girls cricket team both progressed to State finals, an outstanding achievement that reflects the depth of talent and teamwork within our sports programs.

We were delighted to receive the Spirit of Sport award at last week's state Year 7/8 mixed hockey tournament. This

acknowledgement recognises not just the team's effort on the ground, but the encouragement and teamwork they showed to one another - highlighting that State-level accolades come in many forms and aren't solely defined by winning.

Our academic results reinforce this pattern of excellence. NAPLAN data placed Camperdown College above state averages in many areas, demonstrating strong learning growth across year levels. In addition, seven Year 9 students were awarded certificates for their outstanding performance on these tests. Equally pleasing are our attendance levels and the positive responses recorded in the staff and parent opinion surveys of which sit above state benchmarks. These results are a testament to the hard work of our students, the dedication of our staff and the supportive partnerships we share with families.

We eagerly await the release of our VCE results and are confident that our average study scores will once again outperform state averages across many subject areas. This confidence comes from the consistent dedication we see in our senior students and the quality of teaching and support provided by our staff. We look forward to celebrating their achievements as another reflection of the strong academic culture that defines Camperdown College.

Together, these achievements paint a clear picture: Camperdown College is a school that not only meets state standards but continually strives to rise above them. We are immensely proud of our students and the vibrant, highachieving learning community they help create

Year 6 Graduation Ceremony:

Our Year 6 students are nearing the end of their primary school journey with their graduation ceremony only a couple of weeks away, on Monday 15th December. Dinner for students and staff will begin at 5.45pm with the official ceremony commencing at 7pm, with family and friends invited to attend this momentous occasion. More information has been sent home with Year 6 students today.

Glasses for Kids Program:

Last week, 90 of our Prep – Year 3 students were seen by a qualified optometrist at the Junior Campus across three days as part of the Glasses for Kids program. Out of the 90 students seen, 17 students were fitted for a new pair of glasses at no cost with these expected to arrive next week. Referrals and further testing were advised for some students, with all students receiving a letter from the optometrist outlining findings and recommendations. We are extremely fortunate to have this initiative visit us this year and provide such an important service to our students at no cost.

Parent Teacher Interviews and Semester Reports:

Next Friday, students will be bringing home their Semester 2 report outlining the academic and social achievements they have made this semester. We ask families to read these reports over next weekend and share the information communicated with your child, in preparation for parent teacher interviews on Tuesday 9^{th} December. These interviews are a wonderful opportunity for staff to expand on the content provided in the report and answer any questions you may have. Bookings can be made on Compass with these opening earlier this week. Year 1-6 interview times will be available from 1pm-6pm, whilst Prep interviews times will be available from 3.30pm-6pm.

Step Up Day:

Step Up Day is being held on Tuesday 9th December. All Junior Campus students will step up to their 2026 class with their 2026 teacher from 9am until 12pm. Our 2026 Prep students will be with us for most of the day from 9am – 2.30pm, whilst our 2026 Year 7 students will be enjoying a full day at the Senior Campus.



IMPORTANT PRODUCT SAFETY RECALL: COLOURED SAND

Dear Parents and Caregivers,

We are informing you about a national product safety recall of several brands of coloured sand that are commonly used in schools, early childhood centres, and homes for children's play and craft activities. The suppliers have issued this recall because some batches of these products may contain traces of naturally occurring asbestos.

Affected Products:

The recalled products were sold at various major retailers, including Officeworks, Kmart, Target and Woolworths. Affected brands and products include:

- Educational Colours Rainbow Sand (1.3kg, various colours)
- Creatistics Coloured Sand (1kg, various colours)
- **Kadink** Coloured Decorative Sand (6x10g, 1.3kg, 2kg, various colours)
- Kmart Australia Active Sandtub 14 piece Sand Castle Building Set and Magic Sand tubs (blue, green, pink)

HOW TO SUPPORT YOUR (HILD UIG WITH THE NEW SOCIAL MEDIA REGULATIONS

From Wednesday 10 December 2025, the Online Safety Amendment (Social Media Minimum Age) Act 2024 will require social media platforms to:

- prevent children and young people under 16 from having a social media account
- deactivate or freeze existing accounts held by people under 16.

Delaying access to social media protects the health and wellbeing of young people and gives them extra time to build real world connections and digital literacy skills. The responsibility will be on the social media platforms, not parents, carers, children or schools, to implement these new restrictions. Most popular social media platforms will be age restricted. These include Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat, TikTok, X (formerly Twitter), Reddit and YouTube. Messaging services and online games, as well as apps and platforms that support health and education, can still be used.

How to help under 16s prepare for the change:

Parents and carers play an important role in supporting their children to be safe online. To help get under 16s ready for the social media minimum age requirements, you can go to the eSafety website to learn more about the social media age restrictions and find tips on how to talk about social media age restrictions with young people.

What the change means for our school:

At our school, most age-restricted social media platforms are blocked for student use on the school network. Our school allows students in Year 10-12 student access to YouTube in a logged-out state. However, this access is restricted so mature content cannot be viewed. To keep up to date about the new social media age restrictions, visit the eSafety website and subscribe to their newsletter.

Senior Campus Calculator requirements 2026

Please find some information below to help students and their families check that they have the correct calculator for next year.

Scientific Calculator

It is expected that all students in year 7-12 have access to their **own** scientific calculator for maths classes. Some calculators are damaged or lost from year to year, so we ask parents to check with their students to see if a new calculator needs to be purchased for the following year.

These calculators (see below) have a range of functions (buttons) that are required to complete their maths work. Whilst they may not use them in every session it is expected that they take them to all maths classes. The 'green' TI-30XB is the model on our booklist, but there are many different models that are suitable, and they do not require this exact model. It is possible to purchase a suitable model at the supermarket for under \$20.

All students are required to retain their scientific calculator for Year 11 and 12 for both the VCE and VM pathways, as it is the <u>only</u> model allowed in the GAT (General Achievement Test) mid-year, and all students are required to complete it. It also the only calculator that is allowed in some VCE science exams.

Year 10

In line with previous years, it is the expectation that all Year 10 and VCE (11 & 12) mathematics students have access to their own CAS Calculator- TI-nspire CX II, these calculators are on the booklist. We understand that these calculators are expensive to purchase (~\$250) and encourage families to purchase these second hand if possible.

Student in Year 10 intending to continue into a VCE maths pathway in Year 11 & 12, must have the model with the **blue back**. Students in Year 10 intending to continue into a VM pathway in Year 11 & 12, can use a model with a black back, however, please be aware that whist this model purchased second hand will be cheaper it may be more challenging to re-sell at a later stage.


